Message:

This joint transmittal is for both DHS Child Welfare and Developmental Disability Services, in order to clarify the process to be followed when a child in the State's custody is determined to be ineligible for developmental disability (DD) services.

CW case workers and supervisors:

In some instances, a CW case worker may wish to contest the determination. However, DHS employees are not permitted to dispute an internal agency decision. Therefore, you may not act as the child's/claimant's representative in order to contest the DD eligibility determination.

However, as the child's legal guardian, you have the right to discuss this determination with your local Community Developmental Disability Program (CDDP) office. The Eligibility Specialist (identified on the denial notice) will explain in better detail why services were denied or terminated and/or whether more information might support a new referral for DD services. If you still disagree with the eligibility determination and believe it should be contested, you must identify another resource to serve as the child's representative. Some suggestions are:

- a foster parent
- a relative of child
- CASA
- Disability Rights Oregon (503-243-2081 or 1-800-452-1694)
- the child's attorney
