

Glossary of Terms

ADLs (Activities of Daily Living). Basic personal every day activities, such as: eating, using the restroom, grooming, dressing, bathing, and transferring.

APD/AAA (Aging & People with Disabilities/Area Agency on Aging). These are offices serving older adults, ages 65 and over, and adults with physical disabilities. Staff at these offices carries OSIPM cases for children under 18 years old and are receiving SSI.

Branch 5503. Also referred to as 5503 or OHP branch 5503, this is the [Oregon Health Authority's](#) Statewide Processing Center. As of September 2013, all medical cases except [OSIPM](#), [QMB](#), and the [refugee medical program](#) (REFM) cases are carried and administered by branch 5503.

CIIS (Children's Intensive In-Home Services). These are waived services for children who require a higher specialized care in order to remain in the family home. Oregon has 3 CIIS programs: [Medically Fragile](#), [Medically Involved](#), and [Behavior](#).

CMEU (Children's Medical Eligibility Unit). This is branch 5517. This unit processes OSIPM applications and carries OSIPM cases for children under 18 years old and are not receiving SSI. CMEU staff determines *financial eligibility* and facilitates PMDDT process.

CNA (Children's Needs Assessment). This is a functional needs assessment tool, used to determine the support needs for children receiving in-home supports and services.

CW Medical (Child Welfare Medical). Children who are in CW custody receive medical benefits determined by CW Federal Revenue Specialists (FRSs). For CW Adoption/Guardianship Assistance (AA/GA) cases, benefits are determined by CW AA/GA staff in Salem. CW medical can be Medicaid (title XIX) or General Fund.

Family Home. This is the primary residence for a child. It is not under contract with the Department as a certified foster home for children with IDD or a licensed facility. It may include a foster home funded by Child Welfare.

IADLs (Instrumental Activities of Daily Living). Activities other than ADLs required to enable a child to remain in the family home and community such as: meal planning and preparation; shopping for food, clothing, and other essential items; performing essential household chores; communicating by phone or other media; and participating in the community.

ICF/ID (Intermediate Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICF/ID)). This is an institution-based, rather than community-based, that provides comprehensive services to individuals with ID. Oregon has federal waivers to offer community-based care options for individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities (I/DD) within Oregon.

K-Plan. Also known as [Community First Choice Option or K Option](#). It is a new option that allows states to provide home and community-based care under a State Plan with a 6% increase in Federal matching funds for home and community-based services. LOC (Level of Care). This means the institutional level of care for an intermediate care facility for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ICF/ID). It is one of the eligibility requirements for a child to receive in-home supports and services in the family home.

MAGI (Modified Adjusted Gross Income). This is a new method of determining medical coverage based on income per the Affordable Care Act. Oregon has been using this method since October 2013. Children can qualify as a MAGI-Child (Medicaid) or MAGI-CHIP (non-Medicaid).

OHP (Oregon Health Plan). This is a State Medicaid program that provides health care coverage to low-income Oregonians. For children who receive benefits under the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), it is the same OHP benefit package as for those who receive benefits under OHP Medicaid program.

OSIPM (Oregon Supplemental Income Program Medical). A Medicaid program which provides a comprehensive medical benefit package for individuals who are 65 and older, blind, or disabled. APD under the Department of Human Services (DHS) administers OSIPM, and the Oregon Health Authority administers MAGI programs.

PMDDT(Presumptive Medicaid Disability Determination Team). This is a team of DHS employees who make disability determinations for APD and DD in order for individuals to meet the basis of need for OSIPM prior to the Social Security Administration (SSA) making a determination. The PMDDT applies SSA's rules for determining disability.

SSI (Supplemental Security Income). A federal income program administered by the Social Security Administration (SSA) to help those who are 65 and older, blind, and disabled and have limited income and resources to meet basic needs.

Title XIX. Also referred to as Medicaid Title XIX. It is Title XIX of the Social Security Act (part of the Social Security Amendments of 1965) which established the Medicaid program to provide medical and health related services for individuals and families with low incomes.
